He is not known to have sent any of his pay to her while in the army, but his wife and endeavor to live so is shown, he is now destitute.*

D. 1861 from (8) an inflammation of the lungs occurred in the service aforesaid, and while in the line of his duty (9) by exposure, essential to his complete. She further declares that her said son, upon whom she was wholly or in part dependent for support, having left no widow or minor child under sixteen years of age surviving; declarant makes this application for a pension under the above mentioned act, refers to the evidence filed herewith, and that in the proper department, to establish her claim. She also declares that she has not in any way been engaged in, or aided or abetted the rebellion in the United States; that she is not in the receipt of a pension under the 24 section of the act above mentioned, or under any other act, nor has she again married since the death of her son the said Henry B. Beaudry.

She appoints J. B. S. Scales of Louisville Kentucky her attorney irrevocably with full power of substitution and revocation on his part in her behalf, and authorizes him to receive the Pension Certificate when issued. Her Post Office is at Marionville County of Cumberland and State of Kentucky. That her domicile or place of abode is (10) on road leading from Becksville to Glasgow about 8 miles from Becksville the best part of Cumberland that persons of that name take their name from the names of the mother and the difference in the name

We, *H. R. Davis* of lawful age, a resident of the (1) *Cass* County of *Kentucky* in the State of *Kentucky* and *Geo. W. Williams* of lawful age, a resident of the (1) *Cass* County of *Kentucky* in the State of *Kentucky* upon our oaths, jointly declare that we are personally well acquainted with Mrs. *Rosa Rietzky* mother of (2) *Henry C. Allen* now deceased, and who was late a *private* in company *3rd* commanded by Captain *S. S. Searles* in the *115th* regiment of (3) *West-Cole's* *Infantry* commanded by Col. *Colder* in the war of 1861-2, &c.

We further declare that we were likewise personally well acquainted with the said (2) *Henry C. Allen* deceased, and his said mother, the said Mrs. *Rosa Rietzky* during the lifetime of the former, and know that they recognized each other as mother and son respectively and were so reputed, having never heard a question raised or a doubt expressed to the contrary, as to their being legitimately such. Furthermore, we have often heard the said (2) *Henry C. Allen* during his lifetime, call the said Mrs. *Rosa Rietzky* "mother," and always heard him speak of, and know that he ever treated and respected her as such maternal relation. We also state that she is esteemed and known as a respectable woman in the community of her residence.

We further declare that at the time of service, we resided in the same neighborhood, County and State with the deceased soldier, and know that he, the said (2) *Henry C. Allen* previous to his entering the said service of the United States, was a man of good sound physical health. Our knowledge of said soldier's physical condition prior to enlistment, as above stated, is founded upon actual observation and intimate acquaintance with him and not based upon information derived from others, nor upon general repute. That he died (4) *whilst in* the service aforesaid in the (1) *6th* of *Richmond* in the State of *Virginia* on or about the *19th* day of *May* A. D. 1861, from the effects of (5) *inflammation of the lungs* incurred in the service of the United States, and as we verily believe from general repute, and without the slightest doubt to the contrary, whilst in the line of his duty therein. That Mrs. *Rosa Rietzky* his mother aforesaid, applying for Army Pension by reason of the above named military services is now a widow, and has remained such ever since the death of her husband, whose name was *Henry Hunter* and whose death is circumstantially known to us to have occurred on or about the *10th* day of *July* A. D. 1862, in the (1) *Cass* County of *Kentucky* in the State of *Kentucky*. That (2) *Henry C. Allen* the soldier above named, died unmarried, leaving no widow, child, or children as his heirs surviving. That his mother, Mrs. *Rosa Rietzky* above named is his legitimate and sole legal heir. 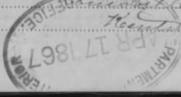
