Carl Wood Dugger was born in Sardis, Mississippi on October 24, 1920. He was the second of three sons blessed to the union of Bessie Mathis Dugger and Woodie Dugger. He was the lone survivor of his family, as both parents and brothers Leslie and Perry preceded him in death.
