

GRAFTON TREW won his fame when he had his big chance in John Waxley's much-discussed play, "THEY SHALL NOT DIE." He appeared in minor roles in several productions, but has had his greatest opportunity in the THEATRE GUILD.

POWELL LINDSAY, the director, is recognized as an outstandingly talented director and actor. He studied at Yale School of the Drama, and organized the famous Theatre Progressive of Connecticut. Under his able and sensitive direction, this group won coveted first place in the Yale Drama Tournament. After writing and directing several plays, Mr. Lindsay helped organize the Playwrights Company of New York and directed their first production, "BIG WHITE FOG." Dr. Ralph Mark Gilbert, author and director of the biblical drama, and pastor of the sponsoring church, is regarded as the Negro race's outstanding religious dramatist. He is author of several religious plays, some of which, "PASSION AND TRIUMPH" (The Negro Passion Play), "WHICH MAN WAS RICH," "THE GUIDING STAR," and "JUDAS ISCARIOT," have been seen by tremendous local audiences.

Dr. Gilbert personally trains large casts for these productions, and many of the young people appearing therein have been with him now for eight years. "JUDAS ISCARIOT" broke all attendance records at the Municipal Auditorium.

"THE PEASANT OF GALILEE" becomes the connecting link in Dr. Gilbert's "LIFE OF CHRIST SERIES." Enacted by a cast of over 200 players, and supported by a chorus of like number, under the baton of Prof. Peter Smalls, this promises to be one of Dr. Gilbert's major triumphs.





Margaret Walker was born in Birmingham, Ala., receiving her early education in Meridian, Miss., Birmingham, and New Orleans. Began writing at the age of 13, and during her school days attracted attention with her remarkably sincere power of expression. Graduated from Northwestern University in 1935, took her A.M. at the University of Iowa in 1940, became Professor of English at Livingstone College, Salisbury, N. C., and is now a member of the Department of English in West Virginia State College.

In 1942 her book, "For My People," inspired by an original poem of exceptional brilliance of the same name, was selected as Volume XII of the Yale Series of Younger Poets.


ROBERT HARRIS

Some Things That You Should Remember About This Series

1. THE NEGRO ARTISTS SERIES, which this year consists of one Tenor, one Baritone, one Poet-Reader, one Pianist, one out-of-town dramatic group, one violinist, a locally prepared and authored religious pageant, and one Soprano, is the most ambitious series of local entertainments ever to be presented to the public of Savannah by any of this city's Negro groups. As such, we need your support and encouragement, so that in the future we may be enabled to bring you an even more impressive array of fine Negro artists.

2. There is a substantial savings in purchasing season tickets, for you will receive \$7.50 worth of entertainment, if purchased event by event, for the sum of only \$5.00.

3. ALL OF THESE ENTERTAINMENTS SHALL BE GIVEN IN THE MAIN AUDITORIUM OF THE FIRST AFRICAN BAPTIST CHURCH, with the exception of "THE PEASANT OF GALILEE," which will play from the stage of the MUNICIPAL AUDITORIUM, on Monday evening, March 18th, 1946. If for any reason there should be a change of place, ample notice will be given the public through the newspapers, and by mail.

4. Provision will be made for those purchasing SEASON TICKETS to have their names placed on our mailing list, so that we might send a reminder to them a week to ten days before any given event shall take place.
