any woman in the neighborhood. That if said John Stow  
had been married we would have heard of it, because  
it was customary among the slaves of the country to  
celebrate their marriage in some way or other  
often they were married by colored ministers, and  
even if they commenced living tog<sup>ether</sup> as man & wife  
without any ceremony at all, it was always pub-  
lished by common rumor throughout the neighborhood  
and especially among their relatives & friends, and was  
also known to their owners, and we have no hesitation  
in saying that said John Stow, deceased, was never  
married before his enlistment in the Army, and if  
he was ever married while in the Army we respectfully  
state that we never heard of it. That said John Stow  
was an affectionate dutiful son & a kind brother,  
was very communicative with his family, and had  
he married after his enlistment he would have com-  
municated the fact to his mother, or some of his  
relatives, and we never heard of his marriage while  
in the Army nor do we believe he was married  
at any time during his enlistment.

Affiants further respectively state that they were living in Nelson County at the time of said John Stow's entombment, about one & one half miles from his owner (Mrs. ~~Mary~~ Stow,) and that they thus had frequent opportunities of observing the actions of said John Stow, & hence make these statements from a personal knowledge of the facts. We further state respectively, that we have no interest direct or indirect in the Penitent claim or any other claim against the U.S. Government, of Maria Stow the mother of said John Stow.

In the matter  
of the contested pension claims of  
Maria, mother, and Anna alleged  
widow of John Stow, late post, Co. K.,  
122nd N.Y. Vol. C. S. I. I have the honor to submit  
the following report as the result of my in-  
vestigations.

It appears that our Anna Stow, alleging  
herself to be the widow of John Stow, filed  
a claim for pension which was allowed  
under certificate No. 137030, dated  
Dec. 31, 1869. On the 3d of February  
1873, our Maria Stow filed a claim  
for pension, based on the same soldier's  
service, alleging herself to be the mother  
of said soldier and denying his marriage  
to the said Anna Stow. Investigation  
was ordered to ascertain the facts relative  
to the soldier's alleged marriage.

The statements of the claimants are found  
in Exhibits A. & B. Maria Stow  
the mother was the slave of the late Eli  
Stow of Bloomfield, Nelson County Ky,  
and her soldier John Stow was born there

slaves of this side Eli Stow. The widow and  
two children of Eli Stow still survive.

The woman Minna was the slave of  
McKelroy Murray of Waterford Spencer  
county Ky, and was living with him at  
the time of the alleged marriage.  
Both the claimants now reside in Louisville  
Ky.

The testimony of Horace Stow Exhibit C<sup>o</sup>  
gives a good account of the soldiers when-  
abouts covering the time of the alleged  
marriage. Her Stow's original testimony  
is in his own handwriting and is  
strictly correct so far as I could determine.  
The Stow family was well known family  
of great respectability and the testimony  
of this witness as well as that of his mother  
and sister is entirely trustworthy.

It appears that Mr Stow hired the boy  
John to our Charles Fornman of Spencer  
early in the year 1861 or 1862. <sup>and probably the former</sup> He could not  
ascertain which. He remained at Mr  
Fornman's a year and was then kept  
at home a year and the following year  
was hired to McKelroy Murray a neighbor  
of Charles Fornman. It is quite  
probable that after being at home  
one year Mr Fornman again

hired the soldier and Mr Murray lived  
with the following year. The witnesses  
could not testify positively on this point but  
the probability is that such was the fact.  
It further appears that during the first  
year that John Stow lived at the Ton-  
mans he began a cohabitation with  
the Maria, then a slave of Mckelroy  
Murrays. The said cohabitation was con-  
tinued up to the date of the soldier's re-  
tirement and two children John and  
Maria were born to the parties. John having  
been born April 4, 1802 and Maria May 9th 1804,  
as shown by the Murray family bibles  
and by the family bible of Maria Stow.  
It appears that this cohabitation  
was not preceded by the marriage ceremony  
customary among slaves. Maria Stow  
claims that she and the soldier were  
privately married by a colored local preacher  
Henry Stow prior to the birth of the child  
Maria, no witness being present but  
Stow's wife. Both Henry Stow and his wife  
are now dead. I could find no witness  
to corroborate this statement of the marriage.  
On this point see all the testimony found  
in Exhibits from "G" to "D" inclusive.  
The Stow family and their slaves certainly

Knew nothing of the soldier's marriage  
to the woman Mesina. The testimony of  
Charles Foreman, John L. Murray  
and Oscar Driddle, the two last named  
members of the Murray family, is found  
in Exhibits "G," "E," & "F." These witnesses know  
nothing of such marriage. The testimony  
of these witnesses and that of others is that  
the parties desired to marry but the  
soldier could not obtain the consent of  
his master Horace Stone. Horace  
Stone and the members of the Stone fam-  
ily testify that consent was never asked.

The Spencer County witnesses all testify  
that the soldier and the woman Mesina  
lived together as husband and wife  
continuously from the time the cohabitation  
began up to the date of the soldier's en-  
listment and that they were recognized  
as husband and wife during that time.  
The Nelson County witnesses did not  
know of any such cohabitation  
though they were aware of the fact that  
the soldier had several children by a  
woman in Spencer county.

I conclude from all the circumstances  
of the case that there was such a recog-  
nition of each other as husband and

wife as well bring the case within  
the meaning of the law on the subject.  
The testimony of the Spencer County witnesses  
is positive to the effect that the parties  
did cohabit as husband and wife from  
a date prior to the birth of the child John  
to the date of his enlistment and that  
they were recognized as husband and wife.  
The difference of the opinions of the  
two sets of witnesses may in a measure  
be explained by the fact that they were  
living twelve or fifteen miles apart at the  
time of the alleged cohabitation and the  
Wilson County witness may not have been  
fully informed as to the doings of the  
soldier.

The date of birth of the child is shown  
by the annexed transcript taken from  
the Murray family bible, as well as by the  
testimony of witness herein.

The witness Susan Shumler also testifies  
that Maria Stone has not remarried  
since the death of the soldier and my  
inquiries corroborate her testimony.

I respectfully recommend that payment of  
pension to Maria Stone be resumed.



## EXHIBIT A.

CASE OF Maria Stone, No. 308,069.

On this 12 day of February, 1875, at  
Savannah, County of Jefferson,  
State of Kentucky, before me, J.C. Black,  
a Special Agent of the Pension Office, personally appeared  
Maria Stone, who being by me duly sworn according to law,  
declares that her age is 65 years, that she resides at Louisville  
County of Jefferson, State of Kentucky, and that

She is the identical Maria Stone who has filed pension claim No. 308,069 as  
mother of John Stone, who was drafted into the United States Army during the war,  
affiant cannot say in what company or regiment. Said soldier was the property of  
Mrs. Maria Stone of Union County Ky. who also owned affiant. She was born in  
Adair County, was about 30 or 35 years old at the time of entering the service, was  
nearly six feet in height and was of dark complexion. At the time he was drafted  
the soldier was working for Mr. McAlary Murray of Union Co. Ky. The  
previous year he had been hired by Charles Fournier a neighbor of Mr. Murray.  
Affiant further states that her son was never married to the best of her knowledge  
and belief, and had no body whom he claimed as his wife, nor does affiant know  
of any woman who claimed the soldier as her husband except one Nissa Stone, late  
a slave of McAlary Murray of Union Co. Ky. and affiant did not hear that  
said woman claimed her son as her husband until after the war. Affiant heard  
that her son had had a couple of children by said Nissa Stone, but she never  
heard that he had married her. Affiant was living at Shivelyville Ky. about  
10 or 15 miles from Flemington, the home of her son and did not hear all  
the news concerning him. The people both white and black did not think  
that the soldier was married to Nissa Stone. Affiant further declares  
that her husband the soldiers father died before the war, and that she has never  
remarried. Affiant belonged to the wife of Eli Stone, father of Maria Stone  
and came into the Stone family at the age of about 16 years, and lived in that



family until freed during the late war. Affiant lived at Shalbyville Ill. in the family of Dr. Otis for nearly a year, and was living there when the soldier enlisted. Affiant had no property and being a slave, her support so far as necessaries were concerned was supplied by her master Horace Stone. Her son, the soldier, sometimes gave her presents of various articles, such as shoes, dresses &c. He gave affiant a dress that cost \$11. the year before he went into the Army. He also purchased sugar, and coffee, and other articles of that kind, when he had the money. He procured money for such purpose by the sale of watermelons, and other garden produce, and by working at jobs at night, such as tying brooms &c. He sent affiant no money while in the Army, and she did not hear from him during that time. Affiant had three other sons, and they all helped her just as the soldier did. Affiant does not claim that the soldier was her only support, or in fact that he did more than his brothers.



CASE OF Menna Stone, No. 137-036

On this 15<sup>th</sup> day of February, 1875, at  
Louisville, County of Jefferson,  
State of Kentucky, before me, J.C. Black,  
a Special Agent of the Pension Office, personally appeared  
Menna Stone, who being by me duly sworn according to law,  
declares that her age is 40 years, that she resides at Louisville  
County of Jefferson, State of Ky., and that  
she is the identical Menna Stone who is pensioned under Act. A. 137-036, as the  
widow of John Stone, Post Co. K. 152<sup>d</sup> U.S.A. Affairs was born in Spencer Co. Ky.  
and while yet a child became the slave of Mr. Henry Murray of said County, and re-  
mained his slave until liberated by the late war. Both Mr. Murray and his  
wife, are now dead, but some of their children survive of whom Susan Shumard  
of Louisville Ky. is one, the remainder living in Spencer Co. Affairs was never  
married but once, and then to the soldier above named. Said soldier was the son  
of Horan Stone, of Nelson Co. Ky. in height he was nearly six feet. complexion  
black, was about 25 years old, drafted in Oct. 1864, and died in 1865 in  
Texas. Affairs heard of his death just before Christmas but he had then been  
dead a long time. Affairs was married to the soldier the summer after the  
birth of their first child John, who was born the 5<sup>th</sup> of April 1862. Affairs and  
soldier were married privately by a colored minister, Henry Stone or the name  
of John Thomas Miller in Spencer Co. Ky. The only record of this marriage, was the  
wife of said Miller, and both these persons are now dead. The soldier was working  
for Charles Freeman at the time of the marriage. The soldier had applied to his master  
Horan Stone, for consent to the marriage, and failed to get it, as Affairs's home  
was so far from the soldiers home, Affairs master consented to the marriage  
and accordingly it took place <sup>the</sup> above. The soldier cohabited with Affairs the  
remainder of the year in which they were married, and also the next year, while he  
was living at the home of Affairs master Mr. Murray who had hired the soldier of his  
master. During this cohabitation the second child Maria was born, date May  
9<sup>th</sup> 1864. The soldier was drafted the fall after the birth of this child. The cohabitation



of the soldier and affiant continued from the date of their marriage, to the time of entering the service and was as close and regular as was generally the case with them. During the year the soldier lived at Neway he was with affiant only of nights after was employed during the day at Toremont. Affiant had had two children by other men prior to her marriage to the soldier. The soldier had been employed at Toremont two years, first probably in 1860, then was at his masters in Wilson County a year then the second year at Toremont probably in 1862. Affiant met the soldier for the first time during his first year at Toremont. Their cohabitation began this year and covered the period of the date of birth of the child John. Said child, was the child of the soldier, and was named by the soldier. During the year that the soldier lived in Wilson (1861) he frequently came to see affiant. Affiant has never married since the death of the soldier. The soldier was a single man, at the time of his marriage to affiant. Affiant further states that when she applied to Mr. Root to get her pension for her she gave the names and ages of her children as she knew them, however Mr. Root said one was born in April, and the other in May it might look as if they were born in the same year, and that he would first try for the one, and afterwards for the other, that the ages of said children are recorded in a book in affiant's possession, as taken from the Murray family Bible, and that affiant has not remarried since the death of her husband.



To the best of my memory he denied being guilty. After leaving him home that year I heard him the next year to Mr. Al. Murray a neighbor of said Fourman, before the year was out John was drafted & took him to Lebanon some twenty odd miles in a buggy, where he was mustered into the Service. He never intimated to me that he had a wife, nor do I believe he ever was married, or that he regarded this woman as his wife. I never heard of John's having a wife until Maria Stone his mother told me that she had applied for a pension and that another woman claimed to be his wife & had got the pension. I think now I will state that it was customary for Negro men to go once or twice a week to see their wives & wives on Wednesday's Saturday nights. That during the year between the year that he was hired to Fourman & Murray he never applied to me for permission to go to the neighborhood but once, nor do I believe he went to that neighborhood but once in that year. Furthermore state that I have no interest direct or indirect in the pension claim of Maria Stone or any other claim of that Stone.



the knowledge of the affiants, that he never expressed a desire, or asked consent to marry

custom of slaves, without consent of his owners, that such consent never was requested  
or obtained so far as affiants know, that when a marriage was contemplated

there was no legal marriage according to the usage of slaves in affiants neighborhood  
that cohabitation without the said consent and ceremony was considered  
illegal that no such marriage was ever celebrated in the case of the soldier.  
John Stone, that the soldier never claimed any woman as his wife so far as affiants  
know, that prior to the time the soldier was drafted no woman ever claimed him  
as her husband, that he did not tell among his fellow slaves, so far as affiants  
know, that he was married to any woman, that when he went into the service  
he sent his clothes to the affiant Sarah Stone, to be kept for him, and also asked if



Black, a Special Agent of the Pension Office, personally appeared Sultan Shmetler, who being by me duly sworn according to law, deposes that her age is 40 years, that he resides at Louisville, County of Jefferson, State of Ky., and that

that she is the daughter of Wm. Murray (now deceased) late of Sparta County Ky. who formerly owned Nimma, widow of John Stone, Post C.R.R. 112<sup>nd</sup> Co. U.S.A. and that she has consequently been acquainted with said Nimma Stone for many years. Affiant further declares that she also knew the soldier above mentioned. He was nearly six feet in height, of dark complexion about 24 years old at time of entering the service and was owned by Mr. Horace Stone of Wilson Co. Ky. The said soldier was hired to a neighbor of affiants father, Charles Forman, by his master for a year in the early part of the war, and the following year was employed by affiants father. Affiant cannot say whether he worked two years or one year for Horace. During the period of the soldiers employment with Forman he began a cohabitation with the girl Nimma applicant herein, and had two children by her. This cohabitation was not founded by a formal marriage. Affiant does not know that any marriage ceremony was ever celebrated between them as according to the custom of slaves. If such a ceremony took place, it was not known to either affiant or any member of his family. The soldier desired to marry the girl Nimma and asked and obtained the consent of affiants father for that purpose. The soldiers owner however opposed the marriage for the reason that the distance between the houses of the slaves was too great. The soldier and the girl however, began a cohabitation



and continued it up to the time the soldier was drafted. During the cohabitation the two children, John & Maria were born, the soldier recognized the children as his own, and every body believed them to be his children. The said John was born in April 1862, and Maria was born about two years later.

The story that the soldier and the girl Minna had been married did not come out until the widow had filed her application for a pension. Affiant has no personal knowledge as to its truth. The relations existing between the soldier and the claimant would in affiants opinion have constituted what was known as marriage among slaves. According to affiants knowledge no formal marriage was necessary and a continued cohabitation was considered marriage. In this sense the soldier and the claimant were looked upon as husband and wife, and it is affiants impression they were generally considered such. Affiant further declares that she has been well and intimately acquainted with Minna Stone ever since the death of the soldier and knows that she has not remarried since that date but remains his widow.




Hon. J. B. Baker,

In the matter of the contested pension claims of Maria, mother, and Minna, alleged widow of John Stone, late 1st Lt. Co. K, 125<sup>th</sup> U.S.A. I have the honor to submit the following report as the result of my investigation.

It appears that one Minna Stone, alleging herself to be the widow of John Stone, filed a claim for pension which was allowed under certificate No. 137, 036, dated February 3, 1869.

On the 3<sup>rd</sup> day of February 1873, one Maria Stone filed a claim for pension, based on the same soldier's service, alleging herself to be the mother of said soldier, and denying his marriage to the said Minna Stone. Investigation was ordered to ascertain the facts relative to the soldier's alleged marriage.

The statements of the claimants are found in Exhibits. A. & B. Maria Stone the mother, was the slave of the late Eli Stone of Bloomfield Nelson County, Ky. and the soldier John Stone was born the slave of the said Eli Stone. The widow and two children of Eli Stone still survive. The woman Minna was the slave of H. Kirby Murray of Waterford Spencer County Ky. and was living with him at the time of the alleged marriage. Both the claimants now reside in Sousville Ky. The testimony of Horace Stone Exhibit "C," gives a good account of the soldiers whereabouts covering the time of the alleged marriage. Mr. Stone's original testimony




is in his own hand writing and is strictly correct so far as I could determine. The Stone family is an old Kentucky family and of great credibility and the testimony of the witness as well as that of his mother and sister is entirely trustworthy.

It appears that Mr. Stone hired the boy John, to one Charles Foreman of Spencer County in the year 1861, or 1863 most probably the former, I could not ascertain which.

He remained at Mr. Foreman's a year, and was then kept at home a year, and the following year was hired to Melchior Murray a neighbor of Charles Foreman.


It is quite probable that after being at home one year Mr. Foreman again hired the soldier, and Mrs. Murray hired him the following year. The witness could not testify positively on this point but the probability is, that such was the fact. It further appears, that during the first year that John Stone lived at Mr. Foreman's he began a cohabitation with this Maria, then a slave of Melchior Murray's. The said cohabitation was continued up to the date of the soldier's enlistment, and two children John and Maria were born to the parties. John having been born April 4<sup>th</sup> 1862, and Maria May 9<sup>th</sup> 1863, as shown by the Murray family bible, and by the family bible of Maria Stone.

It appears that this cohabitation was not preceded by the marriage ceremony customary among slaves. Maria Stone, claimed that she and the soldier were privately married by a colored local preacher, Henry Stone prior to the birth of the child Maria, no witness being present but



Stone's wife. Both Harry Stone and his wife are now dead. I could find no witness to corroborate this statement of the marriage. On this point, see all the testimony former in Exhibits from C to G.

The Stone family and their slaves certainly knew nothing of the soldier's marriage to the woman Emma. The testimony of Charles Freeman, John S. Murray, and Susan Chandler, the two last named members of the Murray family is found in Exhibits G & H. These witnesses know nothing of such marriage. The testimony of these witnesses, and that of others is that the parties desired to marry, but the soldier could not obtain the consent of his master Horace Stone. Horace Stone and the members of the Stone family testify that consent was never asked. The Spencer County witnesses all testify that the soldier, and the woman Emma live together as husband and wife continually from the time the cohabitation began up to the date of the soldier's enlistment, and that they were recognized as husband and wife during that time. The Nelson County witnesses, did not know of any such cohabitation, though they were aware of the fact that the soldier had several children by a woman in Spencer County. I conclude from all the circumstances of the case that there was such a recognition of each other as husband and wife, as will bring the case within the meaning of the law on the subject. The testimony of the Spencer county witnesses is positive to the effect that these parties did cohabit as husband and wife, from a date prior to the birth of the child John, to the date of



his enlistment, and that they were recognized as husband and wife. The difference of <sup>the</sup> opinions of the two sets of witnesses may in a measure be explained by the fact that they were living twelve or fifteen miles apart at the time of the alleged cohabitation, and the Wilson County witness may not have been fully informed, as to the doings of the soldier.

The date of birth of the children is shown by the annual transcript taken from the Murray family bible as well as by the witness here.

The witness Susan Shindler, also testifies that Anna Stone has not re-married since the death of the soldier, and my inquiries corroborated her testimony.

I respectfully recommend that payment of pension to Anna Stone be resumed.



I left John at home that night the next year & told him with what he was charged & to the best of my memory he denied being guilty.

After keeping him home that year I hired him the next year to Mr. Kel Murry a neighbor of said Promace. Before the year was out John was drafted & I took him to Lebanon some Twenty odd miles <sup>where he was mustered into the service</sup> in a buggy. He never intimated to me that he had a wife. Nor do I believe he ever was married or that he regarded this woman to be his wife. I never heard of John having a wife until Mariah <sup>his mother</sup> told me that she had applied for

a pension & that another woman claimed  
to be his wife & had got the pension.  
Furthermore, I will state that it  
was customary for Negro man to  
go once or twice a week to see their  
wives - to wit on Wednesday & Saturday  
nights. That during the year between  
the years that he was hired to Freeman  
& Murry he never applied to me  
for permission to go to that neighborhood  
but once nor do I believe he went  
to that neighborhood but once in

Affiant can not say in what company or regiment. Said soldier was the property of Mr. Horace Stone of Nelson County, Ky., who also owned affiant. He was born in Nelson County, was about 30 or 35 years old at time of entering the service, was nearly six feet in height and was of dark complexion. At the time he was drafted the soldier was working for Mr. McElroy Murray of Spencer County. The previous year he had been hired by Charles Forman a neighbor of Mr. Murray's. Affiant further states that her son was never married to the best of her knowledge and belief and had nobody whom he claimed as his wife, nor does affiant know of any woman who claimed the soldier as her husband except one Anna Stone, late a slave of McElroy Murray of Spencer County, and affiant did not hear that said woman claimed her son as her husband.

until after the war. Affiant heard that her son had had a couple of children by said Minnie Stone but she never heard that he had married her. Affiant was living at Chelbyville Ky. about 12 or 15 miles from Bloomfield, the home of her son and did not hear all the news concerning him. The people both white and black did not know that the soldier was married to Minnie Stone.

Affiant further declares that her husband, the soldier's father died before the war and that she has never remarried. Affiant belonged to the wife of Eli Stone father of Harriet Stone and came into the Stone family at the age of about 16 years and lived in that family until freed during the late war. Affiant lived at Chelbyville Ky. in the family of Dr. Clegg for nearly a year and was living there when her soldier enlisted. Affiant had no property and being a slave her support so far as necessaries were concerned was supplied by her master Harriet Stone. Her son, the soldier, sometimes gave her presents of various articles such as shoes, dresses &c. He gave affiant a dress that cost \$11.00 the year before he went into the army. He also purchased sugar and coffee and other articles of that kind when he had the money. He procured money for such purposes by the sale of watermelons and other garden produce and

by working at jobs<sup>work</sup> such as typing, brocures etc.  
He sent affidavits no money while in the army

The soldier's master however opposed the marriage for the reason that the distance between <sup>the</sup> houses of the slaves was great. The soldier and the girl however began a ~~at~~ cohabitation and continued it up to the time the soldier was drafted. During the cohabitation the two children John & Maria were born. The soldier recognized these children as his own and every body believed them to be his children. The child John was born in April 1862 and Maria was born about two years later. The story that the soldier and the girl Maria had been married did not come out until the widow had filed her application for a pension. Affiant has no personal knowledge as to its truth. The relations existing between the soldier and the claimant would in affiant's opinion have constituted what was known as marriage among slaves. According to affiant he understood no formal marriage was necessary and a continued cohabitation was considered marriage. In this sense.

The soldier and the claimant were looked upon as husband and wife. Affiant family looked upon the parties as husband wife and it is affiants impression that they were generally considered such.

Affiant further declare that she has been well and intimately acquainted with Merritt Stoen ever since the death of the soldier and knows that she has not married since that date but remains his widow.

Inciidental Matter.

Report of Special Agent April 14<sup>th</sup> 1875: It appears that the claimant was a slave and that the soldier was born a slave, the claimant being his mother, upon which she based her claim to pension. She also denies his marriage to Minna Stone, the soldier's widow. Investigation was ordered to ascertain the facts relating to the soldier's alleged marriage. The Special Agent recommends the assumption of payment to the soldier's widow, Minna or Mina Stone, certificate No 137,036.

Synopsis of evidence as follows: E. H. Stone testifies that the soldier was about twenty one years old when he enlisted. Affiant does not remember that the soldier ever reported to his fellow slaves that he had a wife.

Affiant's mother was the former owner of the soldier and affiant resided with his mother. The soldier never asked consent to marry as was customary, and his marriage was unknown and unsuspected by affiant and his mother, or by the slaves of the family. Affiant hired the soldier to a Mr. Freeman, who informed him that the soldier he believed had got a girl with child near him. Affiant left the soldier home next year, and told him that he had been charged with getting the girl with child, which "I think he denied," and the succeeding year affiant hired him to Mr. Kil Murray, a neighbor of Freeman's, and before the year was out he was drafted. Mother of Horace Stone who owned the soldier. <sup>The soldier was</sup>  
born and raised on the Stone farm, and lived on said farm all his  
life up to the time he was hired by Mr. Freeman of Somers Co. He was  
first hired in Somers by early in the war or just prior to its outbreak.  
He was absent from home for about two to three years before being  
drafted. So far as affiants know he was a single man when drafted.  
He could not have been married without consent of master and he did  
not request said consent. Affiants believe the soldier was not  
married because the customary marriage <sup>and</sup> formality among slaves  
upon such occasions, did not transpire.

John S. Murray, son of M.R. Murray, late the owner of Mining Lake  
claims him as the soldier's widow testifies confirming the former  
testimony as to the hiring of the soldier, and testifies that during that time  
the soldier was in the employ of Charles Freeman he cohabited with  
Anna, and that his cohabitation continued up to the time the soldier  
was drafted. That after the time for which Freeman had hired him  
affiant's father hired the soldier, and hired him at the time he was  
drafted. The soldier and Anna cohabited as husband and wife, but  
were not united by any ceremony as was common among slaves.  
They claimed and recognized each other as husband and wife,  
and were so recognized. During the cohabitation they had two  
children, John, and Maria, which the soldier recognized as his  
children.

Susan Simmles, daughter of M.R. Murray, testifies substantially  
the same as her brother John S. Murray, as to the soldier being  
hired, and as to his cohabitation with Anna, also that he had two  
children by her. The soldier was not married to Anna, but asked  
and obtained the consent of affiant's father for that purpose. The soldier  
never opposed the marriage because of the distance between the two  
houses. The cohabitation continued until the soldier was drafted,  
during which time the two children John, and Maria, were born,  
and the soldier recognized the children as his own. John was born  
in April 1860, and Maria was born two years later. The relations

between the soldier and claimant Minna Stone, as they existed would have constituted what was known among slaves as marriage. Chas. H. Norman testifies that he hired the soldier as near as he can recollect in the year 1862 and for two years in succession, and that his neighbor McElroy Murray hired the soldier the following year 1863, during which the soldier was drafted.

During the latter part of the first year the soldier was in affiant's employ he began cohabiting with Anna, one of MCK Murray's slaves, and continued to cohabit with her until the soldier was drafted into the service. During said cohabitation two children were born to them, which the soldier recognized as his own.

Harriet Allen, formerly a slave also Hamilton Mason Henry Mason, testify that they had no knowledge of the soldier's marriage to Minna Stone. These affiants are colored people and relatives or neighbors of the soldier.

Ann May, testifies, that she is a sister of Minna Stone, and lived about six miles from Mr. Murray when her sister was married to the soldier. Affiant was not present at the marriage but heard it was to happen, and afterward that it had occurred. They cohabited and recognized the children as the soldier's. The soldier recognizes the child John as his own.

Ellen Lilly, testifies that the soldier and Minna Stone cohabited and had two children, whom the soldier recognizes as his own, but that they were not married, although regarded as husband and wife by the colored people.




