
Let Not Your Heart Be Troubled

Obituary

Robert "Brother" Berry Jr. was born January 4, 1936 in Pontotoc County to the late Robert and Irene White Berry. He was the sixth of nine children. His early education was in Pontotoc County. After the eighth grade he moved to Tupelo to live with an uncle who unexpectedly passed just weeks after his move. He then went to live with Ellis and Pearl Agnew and their children where he lived until he graduated from Carver High School in 1953 and later from Rust College.

Berry was one of the featured speakers at a Race Relations Sunday event his senior year in high school in 1953. An accountant named M. M. Winkler, a member of First Methodist Church in Tupelo, heard Berry speak that day and was so impressed with him that he offered Berry a four-year scholarship to Rust College in Holly Springs.

After graduating from Rust College in 1957, Berry met and married Lena Laverne Lockhart and to that union one son was born; Rory of St. Paul, Minnesota. Berry took a teaching job with the Carroll County School District in Vaiden. He taught for two years and then entered the Army where he served as a water purification specialist at Ft. Belvoir, Virginia, with the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers.

After leaving active duty from the Army in 1961, Berry returned to the field of teaching. He taught again in Carroll County from 1961 to 1965 and in the Winona City School District from 1965 to 1967. Berry earned a Masters degree in 1968 from the University of Mississippi before moving to Greenville to teach at Solomon Junior High School.

In 1969, Berry took a position at Saints Junior College in Lexington as the director of an OEO-funded Migrant Farmers Program until June, 1970, at which time he accepted a job with the North Central Planning and Development District in Winona. Berry was one of the first employees of this newly created agency as an Administrative Assistant and after several years, rose to the position of Executive Director before retiring.

As Administrative Assistant and Senior Loan Officer with North Central Planning, Berry had a tremendous impact on the development of Montgomery County and the surrounding area. He was involved in industrial, recreational and infrastructural development for twenty-six years. Such projects include: the Winona Neighborhood Facility on Powell Street,

the Winona Recreational Park adjacent to the hospital, the West Winona Recreational Park, the Kilmichael Recreational Park, tennis courts in Duck Hill, the Winona North Industrial Park and the Kilmichael Industrial Park. Among industries that he assisted in bringing to Montgomery County are Multicraft, Angelica, Krueger International, and Stofurnco, Inc. Berry secured funding for housing, water, sewage and street improvements for the city of Winona, Duck Hill and Kilmichael. He also assisted in implementing the construction of the Tom Dulin Complex.

Robert Berry, Jr. was a prominent leader in community affairs on the local, state and national levels. He was the first black to serve on the Winona Separate School District Board of Trustees. He served for eight years on the school board. He served for several years on the Montgomery County Economic Council of Directors. He was elected Minority Advocate of the year in 1986 by the U. S. Small Business Administration's Jackson office. He received Congressional Recognition in 1976 and the Montgomery County Heritage Achievement award in 1996. He was a member of the Mississippi School Board Association in 1979, the United Methodist Foundation at Mississippi Valley State University and the Grenada-Montgomery County Rust Alumni Chapter.

Berry's association with and work for his church was one of the most important aspects of his life. He confessed faith in Jesus at a young age and worked tirelessly for the church. As a longtime member of Haven United Methodist Church in Winona, he has served in nearly every lay capacity; Equalizer Delegate (Greenwood District) of the Mississippi Conference of the United Methodist Church, Chairman of the Administrative Council, Trustees, PPRC Committee and also served on the Board of Ordained Ministry.

Berry leaves to cherish his memory; his wife of 52 years, Lena L. Berry of Winona, MS; his son, Rory (Jacqueline) Berry of St. Paul, MN; one grand-daughter, Jillian Victoria Berry of St. Paul, MN; seven brothers; Charlie Berry, Milwaukee, WI; Ottis (Mary) Berry, Antelope, CA; Oliver (Margaret) Berry and Clarence (Bobbie) Berry, of Chicago, IL; James (Marilyn) Agnew and Frank Agnew of Tupelo, MS; Bennie (Shelia) Agnew of Chicago, IL; three sisters: Mable L Kirk of Pontotoc, MS; Tommie Pinkins and Pearlean Agnew, of Tupelo, MS and two other sisters-in-law: Lula Mae Davis and Annie L Lockhart of Vaiden, MS and a host of nieces, nephews, relatives and friends.




I'd rather see a sermon than hear one and day,

But there's no misunderstanding how you act and how you live.


