RICHARD ALLEN LEONARD, SR., was born June 23, 1923, in Marion County, South Carolina, to the late Reverend James and Connie Davis Leonard. On September 23, 1998, his life was ordered to a higher realm.

He received his early Christian training and nuturing at Saint James A.M.E. Church in Marion County.

He graduated from Marion County Training School in 1943. Shortly thereafter, he entered into the United States Marine Corps, where he received an honorable discharge in 1946.

After completing his tour of duty, he enrolled in Clafin College, Orangeburg, South Carolina, and received a B.A. Degree. While at Claflin, he became a member of Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, Inc. It was at this time he met and became engaged to the lovely Sarah Coger of St. George, South Carolina. They were joined in holy matrimony in December, 1951. To this union two children were born, Dianne Lorraine and Richard Allen, II.

Reverend Leonard aspired to the ministry at an early age, which led him to Gammon Theological Seminary in September, 1949. He graduated in 1952 with a Bachelor of Divinity degree. In 1962, he earned a Master of Science degree from South Carolina State College, Orangeburg, South Carolina. In 1975, the Doctor of Divinity degree was conferred upon him by Allen University.

Reverend Leonard was ordained an Itinerant Elder in the African Methodist Episcopal Church in 1952 and received his first appointment to Beard Chapel A.M.E. Church, Charleston, South Carolina that same year. Other pastorial charges include Shiloh A.M.E., Charleston, S.C. (18 years), and Greater St. Luke A.M.E. Church, Charleston, S.C. (7 years). In 1971, he was appointed Presiding Elder of the Edisto District in the South Carolina Annual Conference. He was appointed Presiding Elder of the Kingstree District, Palmetto Annual Conference in 1988 and served faithfully until his death.

Reverend Leonard was a member of the 1968, 1976, 1980, 1984, 1988, 1992, and 1996 General Conferences. He served on the General Board of the A.M.E. Church from 1976-1980. He served on the Episcopal Committee of the A.M.E. Church for the 1984 and 1992 Quadrenniums. He was a delegate to the World Conference on Methodism in 1981,1986, 1991, and 1996.

His community involvements include the Colleton and Charleston counties Democratic Party, Past Master of Sunlight Lodge No. 221, George Washington Carver Consistory No. 162, life member of the NAACP, and associate life member of NCNW and second vice president of the S.C. First Congressional District Black Caucas.

At the time of his demise, Rev. Leonard was serving as a Council Member of the World Methodist Council, a Trustee Board Member of Allen University in Columbia, S.C., and Treasurer of the Reid House of Christian Service in Charleston.

Reverend Leonard was an educator in the public schools of Colleton County from 1952 to 1980. He retired as principal of Ruffin High School. While at Ruffin High, he was cited by both Ebony Magazine and the Education Testing Service of Atlanta, Georgia for his contributions to the intergration of the public schools. He was the first president of the intergrated Colleton County Education Association and chaired the Ethics Committee of the Palmetto Teachers Association. In 1979, he received the Colleton County Outstanding Educator's Award.

Reverend Leonard was a quiet, soft spoken and dignified man. As a presiding elder he was full of innovative ideas and programs for his districts. He was committed and dedicated to those he served. His visionary leadership has left an indelible imprint on the lives of many throughout the African Methodist Episcopal Church. His motto was: "I live so that I will be ready to die."

Reverend Leonard's life-living left beautiful memories that will always be cherished and treasured by his devoted wife, Sarah; their two children, Dianne Lorraine of Greenville, S.C., Richard Allen, II (Pamela) of Rock Hill, S.C., two grandchildren, Richard Allen, III and Alyson Nicole; three sisters, Nadene Evans and Marie Leonard both of Marion, and Lena Tarpley of Oakdale, Louisiana; (his twin sister Sarah who preceded him in death) and one brother, Rev. Romeo Leonard of Columbia; seven sisters-in-law; four brothers-in-law, nieces, nephews and a host of other relatives and friends.
