Reflection of a Life "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith" II Timothy 4:7

Mr. Shedrich H. Frazier, Sr., 100 years old, of Batesville, MS made his transition on November 14, 2019 at Sardis Community Nursing Home. Mr. Frazier was born in Panola County, MS on June 4, 1919 to the late Perlandas Frazier, Sr. and the late Parthenia Edmond Frazier. He was one of twelve children, all 11 siblings preceded him in death. He received his formal education at Shiloh School. Mr. Frazier, better known as Shed, was a lifetime member of Shiloh C.M.E. Church in Sardis, MS. He was a faithful member of the Trustee Board and was the oldest living member of the church. In 1941, he was drafted into the United States Army. Once returning home in August 1945, he helped his family with farming and later married Hattie Mae Cooper on August 15, 1952. From this union, six children were born. John Thomas Brassell preceded him in death, James Brassell (Bettye), Brenda F. Nash (John), Rosa M. Hughes (William), Shedrich Frazier, Jr. (Brenda), and Joyce A. McKinney (Larry). He has 19 grandchildren, 25 great-grandchildren, and 7 great-great grandchildren and a host of nieces, nephews, cousins and friends.

He began his military life at the age of 22 years old. Due to his small stature, they rejected his enlistment and he was directed to come back during the next draft. Mr. Frazier did not let that stop him, he went to Sardis, MS and from there he was examined and placed in Class 1A. He was deported to Camp Shelby in Mississippi for his physical and then assigned to Fort Frances E1 in Cheyenne, Wyoming and there he completed 13 weeks of training. While serving in the Army, he had the opportunity to travel to Brownwood, TX (Camp Bowie), Oakland, CA, rode the Queen Elizabeth to Sidney, Australia, then on to the East Indies, Papua, New Guinea, and then the Philippines. He had the opportunity to be stationed at Fort Bragg in North Carolina, Fort Jackson in South Carolina, Fort Lee in Virginia, and Camp Gordon in Tallahassee Florida. He was active in the United States Army for four years, from 1941 until his honorable discharge on August 16, 1945.

Mr. Frazier has done SO MUCH in his 100 years of life. He held employment at Buckeye Cellulose in Memphis, TN, Poloron Plant in Batesville, MS where he retired after 13 years and then worked as a Truck Driver for Panola County. He had many hobbies and talents that consisted of playing cards, making muscadine wine and home brew (beer), hunting, telling jokes, playing baseball and just until 2018, he weaved the bottom of ladder back chairs.
