Thomas Wright, Sr., affectionately known as "Tommy or Big Wright", was born to the late Thomas Wright, Sr. and the late Anna Wheelings Wright on June 27, 1935 in Charleston, South Carolina. He lost his father, Thomas Wright, Sr., at the early age of five.

Thomas attended the public schools of Charleston County. He was a 1953 graduated of Burke High School. In the summer of 1953, Thomas joined the United States Army with the intentions of taking care of his mother, Anna Wright, whom he cherished so much. After serving his tour, he was honorably discharged.

Thomas came from a small family but wanted a large family of his own, so he set out to find his lifelong mate. He met the love of his life, Julia Mae Smith. They were married on March 11, 1956. To this union eight children, Thomas, Jr., William Eugene, Sharon Elaine, Theresa Rona, Jacqueline Denise, Anna Maria, Timothy Lamont, and Tyrone Lamar, were born.

He was a loving and devoted husband, father, grandfather, great-grandfather, and great great-grandfather. Thomas was well liked by everyone that knew him. He was a kind, gentle man who touched people with his warmth.

In 1965, Thomas was employed by Mac Pace Patrol Company. He was hired as a security guard for various businesses in the City of Charleston. He patrolled places such as County Hall, the Municipal Auditorium, and the Dock Street Theater just to name a few.

Thomas was dedicated and well liked by his employers, Mac Pace, who offered him a private security job with Sam Solomon. Although he was hired by Sam Solomon, he continued to provide security for other businesses.

As Thomas continued his journey through life, he gained employment in 1970 at the Charleston Air Force Base. There he worked at the Flight Terminal loading and unloading military cargo for the soldiers. He worked diligently there for 36 years until he retired. Thomas life was still not complete because he ventured away from something he loved so much and that was to be the best public servant he could be. In 1977, Thomas joined the Charleston Police Department and got back what he was missing, a career in law enforcement. Thomas was very clear on his responsibilities as an officer. He loved his job and was very committed. Thomas worked relentless hours at the Joe Riley Stadium where the management and employees considered him as the Ambassador of the stadium.

In 2006, Thomas found himself at home taking care of his wife Julia, after she suffered a stroke. He made sure she had the best care possible. Thomas loved her unconditionally. He was her caregiver until his health failed.

Thomas served 36 years as an officer and retired in May 2010 as a Lieutenant from the City of Charleston Police Department. Retiring for him was one of the most difficult things he had to ever do in his life, but he knew it was time to call it quits. If he was given the chance, he would have returned to his world of law enforcement at the age of 75. Protecting the citizens of the City of Charleston brought him much joy.
