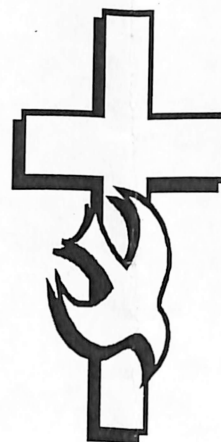

Obituary

Rev. Cicero Mullen was born October 3, 1920 to the late Johnny and Annie Mullen. He attended public schools in his place of birth, Fairfield, Freestone County, Texas.

Rev. Mullen served his country by joining the United States Army during World War II. After his honorable discharge, he married the late Leonell Mullen also of Freestone County, Texas. To this union, one child was born.

For 30 years, he owned and operated Mullen's Barber Shop in West Dallas. He was later employed 18 years with Veteran's Administration Hospital. After retirement, he volunteered seven years at the VA Hospital Day Treatment Center.

Cicero later married Jettie Rose Isadore of Teague, Texas. This loving union was blessed 23 years until his death.

On Thursday, November 20, 1997, Rev. King Cicero Mullen whom we knew and loved slipped across the threshold that we call death, but death to a Christian is moving out of his cold, dark world into eternal daylight. Moses died, Paul died, Jesus died, and all must die. There is no other way of eternal daylight.

Cicero Mullen was an humble, peace-loving person who deeply loved the Lord and His word. He accepted Christ at an early age. In the year 1967, he accepted the Lord's call to preach the gospel. He did so, prayerfully and fervently throughout his days. One brother, Aaron Mullen; two sisters, Mercedes Green and Hercules Thomas and one daughter, Janice Marie Anderson preceded him in death.

He is survived by a loving wife, Jettie Rose; devoted daughter, Wanda Sue Mullen; four grandchildren; four great grandchildren; nieces, nephews, and a host of relatives and friends.
